creative person? What time of day are you most creative?
If you could create a new animal, what would it be like?
What would be its most important feature? What would
you call it?

Read Genesis 1 and John 1:1-5

- 1. What repeated words or phrases do you observe in Genesis 1? What does this pattern tell you about the order of creation? Its author? Its purpose? Its climax? Its goodness? Its completeness?
- 2. Why does the Gospel of John begin with "in the beginning" rather than at Jesus' birth?
- 3. What facts about "the Word" can you find in John 1: 1-5?
- 4. What does John 1:1-3 add to your perception of Genesis 1:1-3 and 1:26?
- 5. According to <u>Colossians 1:15-20</u>, what is Christ's role in creation? How does Genesis help you appreciate the nature and work of Christ?



How aware are you of the created world in your everyday life?What aspect of the created world is most inspiring to you? Why? How does it affect your understanding of God?

What does John's emphasis on the pre-existent, creative Christ mean to you?

According to <u>Romans 1:20-25</u> and <u>Hebrews 11:1-3</u>, what should be our response to God's self-revelation in the created order?
