Sermon Guide

Luke 11:1-13



In Luke 11:1-13, Jesus teaches the disciples to pray in response to the disciples' request, "Lord, teach us to pray." How do you usually pray? Do you have a set time? A set place? Or are you more spontaneous when you pray?
 What do you use to prepare for prayer? A psalm? A devotional guide? A hymn?

Describe a time when you experienced an answer to

prayer. What happened? How did it affect your prayer life?

Read Luke 11:1-13

- 1. In Jesus' model prayer (vv. 2-4), what two concerns related to God come first? Why? What personal concerns then follow?
- 2. How do prayer and forgiveness relate?
- 3. What does the parable in vv. 5-8 teach about prayer? How do verses 9-10 relate to the parable? What attitude is implied in verses 9-10? How do verses 11-13 clarify the intent of verses 9-10?
- 4. What is the most valuable gift God can give (v. 13)?



What grade would you give yourself on prayer? How would you like to improve your prayer life?

What concerns occupy most of your time in prayer? Praise?
Confession? Petition? Why? In which area do you want to grow?
How will you make time to seek His face in prayer this week?
